Background:

Every year the City solicits bids for various water treatment chemicals for the purpose of securing pricing for the following fiscal year. This year the bid was advertised in the *Southern Illinoisan* on Saturday, December 14, 2024, and the bid specifications were provided to sixty eight (68) firms and four (4) plan houses, as shown on the attached Certificate. As in prior years, the quantities indicated in the specifications are estimates only for the purpose of competitive bidding.

Bids were received from sixteen (16) firms listed on the Bid Tabulation. Low bids that meet the minimum specifications for each of the chemicals are listed below.

1. Liquid Alum to Chemtrade Chemicals, Parsippan, NJ, in the amount of \$0.1234 per pound (estimated cost of \$86,380);
2. Ammonium Sulfate to Baker Services, Inc., Atchinson, KS, in the amount of \$0.195 per pound (estimated cost of \$15,600);
3. Anionic Polymer to SNF Polydyne Inc., Riceboro, GA, in the amount of \$2.52 per pound (estimated cost of \$6,300);
4. Carbon to Donau Carbon US, LLC, Dunnellon, FL, in the amount of \$0.89 per pound (estimated cost of \$22,250);
5. Cationic Polymer to SNF Polydyne Inc., Riceboro, GA, in the amount of \$1.11 per pound (estimated cost of \$44,400);
6. Caustic Soda to Univar Solutions USA, LLC, Tempe, AZ, in the amount of \$0.1906 per pound (estimated cost of \$95,300);
7. Chlorine to PVS Chemicals, Inc., Festus, MO, in the amount of \$0.9135 per pound (estimated cost of \$63,945);
8. Fluoride to Hawkins, Inc., Roseville, MN, in the amount of \$0.27 per pound (estimated cost of \$10,800);
9. Potassium permanganate to Hawkins, Inc., Roseville, MN, in the amount of \$4.15 per pound (estimated cost of \$31,125).

Sufficient funds will be included in the FY 2026 Budget for these estimated chemical purchases.

Three low bidders for Potassium Permanganate were disqualified for failure to meet minimum specifications: Chemrite, Inc., Chemstream, Inc., and Shannon Chemicals Corp.

The City purchases either 500 Iodine Carbon, or 800 Iodine Carbon based on the best value, not both, therefore only 500 Iodine Carbon is being awarded.

Background:

Since 2012, the City has belonged to the Illinois Public Works Mutual Aid Network (IPWMAN) at a cost of \$250 dollars per year. This membership allows the City to request help in case of a natural disaster as well as, requests from the community for equipment and manpower.

IPWMAN has recently updated its by-laws and the membership agreement in three areas:

- 1 To provide clarification that mutual aid is not just for emergencies but includes day-to-day operations and training
2. Transition management from IPWMAN Inc. to IPWMAN an intergovernmental agency
3. Provides a revised process for any future amendments to the agreement

It is requested Council approve a resolution for the Mayor to enter into a Mutual Aid agreement with IPWMAN to continue accessibility to these resources.

Background:

Staff from the Community Development and Economic Development Departments applied for and was awarded a grant from the Illinois Housing Development Authority (IHDA) under the Illinois Strong Communities Program Round 2 in the amount of \$484,00 on September 22, 2023 to demolish abandoned, blighted residential structures. Initially nineteen (19) structures were identified in the grant, with the potential for more to be addressed at a later time. As the structures are approved for demolition, bid, demolished, and contractors paid, IHDA will reimburse the funds expended for direct costs, as well as indirect expenses, such as title searches, and staff time.

Eleven (11) structures have already been demolished under this grant in Round One, Two and Three. This fourth round will include six (6) more abandoned and blighted residential structures. The addresses of these structures are 204 E. Sycamore Street, 505 N. Marion Street, 805 Dorthella Drive, 508 E. Willow Street, 608 E. Jenkins Street, and 501 W. Pecan Street. All principal residential structures will be demolished, as well as outbuildings, overgrowth, sidewalks, and driveways. Lots will be graded and seeded and utilities marked for possible reuse later where appropriate. Bid documents were prepared using the standard City formats for projects of this size. The bid was advertised in the Southern Illinoisan on Saturday, January 4, 2025. A pre-bid meeting was held on Tuesday, January 21, 2025, and the bid opening was held on Tuesday, February 4, 2025. Five (5) bids were submitted. The bids ranged from \$54,850.00 to \$131,773.50. The lowest bidder was disqualified for the bid bond not being sufficient. McVicker Excavating of Herrin, IL, was the lowest acceptable bidder at \$74,640.00 (see attached bid tab).

Staff recommends the Various Residential Demolitions 2024 Round 4 to be awarded to McVicker Excavating, Inc., of Herrin, IL. The contractor will have 60 days to complete the work once the contract is signed.

Background:

The City was recently awarded a Highway Safety Improvement Program Grant in the amount of \$1.8 million for South Wall Street (Walnut Street to South of Grand Ave) to complete a "road diet" for improvements. When complete, the resurfaced Wall Street will have the number of vehicular travel lanes reduced from 4 to 3 with an added center turn lane. The project will also include marked bike lanes in each direction and ADA improvements where sidewalks meet the new pavement. This project was included in the FY2024 CIP for design and pending timely receipt of IDOT approvals, it is planned to let the project in the April 2025 IDOT letting process with Construction beginning in the summer of 2025

The project design is complete and approved for the construction. It is estimated that construction, engineering and construction costs will be \$1,883,556 with the City's portion being \$188,457. The Illinois Department of Transportation (IDOT), which administers the funds, requires a formal resolution appropriating the required funds along with an agreement between the City and IDOT. The Federal Highway agreement will be executed by the Mayor pending City Council approval.

Background:

The Illinois Department of Public Health (IDPH) has provided grant funding to Illinois EMS agencies for the purpose of providing organizations with the development and improvement of emergency medical systems including, but not limited to, training of personnel and acquisition, modification, and maintenance to necessary supplies and equipment.

In May 2024, the City of Carbondale Fire Department submitted an application to IDPH with the goal of purchasing a rescue manikin. This purchase would provide first responders with a life-like training tool to be used during training scenarios.

In November 2024, a notice of the grant award was received from IDPH in the amount of \$1,528. This is a no-match, 100% grant-funding purchase.

Background:

In February 2023, City staff applied for a \$95,000 USDA-Rural Development (USDA-RD) Rural Business Development Grant to fund the purchase of furniture, fixtures, and equipment for a proposed co-working space and shared conference room in the Phase 1 portion of the Southern Illinois Multi Modal Station (SIMMS). The application also included a commitment by the City to provide \$700 in matching funds. The grant was approved, and in February 2024, the City entered into a grant agreement with the USDA-RD. (Please see Co-Working Space Floorplan 02 11 2025.pdf and Co-Working Space Renderings 02 11 2025.pdf)

With the impending completion of SIMMS Phase 1, staff is proposing that the City contract with Carbondale Main Street to operate and manage the co-working space (Please see Co-Working Space Management Agreement 02 11 2025.pdf). Carbondale Main Streets stated mission is to enhance and promote the economic and social vitality of Carbondales Main Street district through the ongoing cultivation of unique and quality atmosphere that attracts businesses and shoppers to our downtown, and City staff, Carbondale Main Street Board and Main Street staff believe that operating and managing the co-working space is well within the organizations mission and capabilities.

Background:

Dr. Douglas J. Baker, DDS, has requested a rezoning of property located at 305, 309, and 311 S Oakland Ave from R-1-5, Low Density Residential, and R-2 Medium Density Residential to PAR, Professional Administrative Office, Residential District, in order to expand his existing parking lot.

A rezoning is necessary because the parking lot expansion extends onto an R-1-5- zoned parcel. The remainder of 309 and 311 S Oakland Ave will be converted to greenspace with the possibility of a new house being constructed on 311 S Oakland Ave in the future. Single-family homes are still a permitted use in the PAR District.

By rezoning the property from R-1-5 and R-2 to PAR, the zoning would be more compatible with the current use, and Dr. Baker would be able to expand his parking lot without the issuance of a new Special Use Permit, as a Dentist Office is a permitted use in the PAR district.

The case was heard by the Planning Commission on January 29th, 2025. During the hearing for PC 25-06, no residents spoke in favor or opposition to the proposed rezoning.

The Planning Commission recommended approval of PC 25-06.
